### **Pulpit Notes**

#### **Brothers and Sisters:**

I spent Tuesday night with actors, guides, parking personnel and organizers of the Graveyard Tours, trying to figure out how to do our supposed dress rehearsal in the rain. Weather reports were for heavy rain both nights of our opening weekend. It was chaotic, and when I went to sleep, it was with a sense of dread.

Why are we doing this? I asked myself. There are easier ways to make money.

Indeed, there are. But then, there are easier ways to make more money than being a priest - or a teacher as one of my sons wants to be. Or being any number of things that bring joy and fulfillment if not padded bank accounts.

And the reason we do the Graveyard Tours is not solely for money (though we DO want that, too). We do them because they allow us to not only explore our history but to use it to bring the Good News of Christ - if ever so subtle. We do it because it allows us our creative expression and because it gives our parish a profile in the community. It tells not only our story but the story of God at work in the world.

So, while money is an undeniable element to the tours, it is not our first priority.

On the other hand, when we hold meetings to plan the tours, we necessarily have a different set of priorities - spending priorities. We have to decide how much money we're willing to spend - and on what? How much do we pay the actors? Do we rent a golf cart for the mobility challenged? What do we spend on costumes to make them authentic?

And somewhere in the mix, those two sets of priorities come together. What we want the community to get out of the tours (why we do them) and how we get there financially must work hand in hand, or the tours simply fail.

In the church, we know our general priorities. In a sense, they have never changed. We are here to know Christ and to make him known to the world. We are here to heal and grow our own souls so that we can not only bask in the loving embrace of God in this life and the next but also share that love.

But to get there, we have to know what our spending priorities are. What are we legally required to spend? How much do we spend on keeping the buildings upright? How much do we pay clergy? Do we really want to pay to send youth on a mission trip? Should we get that new Sunday School curriculum? How much do we devote to care for the poor?

Just like in everything else, our overall priorities and our spending priorities have to meet somewhere in the middle if we are going to accomplish anything.

So.... What ARE our spending priorities at St. James'? Better yet, what do you think our spending priorities ought to be? Each year, we hand out a copy of the annual budget. This reflects the priorities we've set for that year. It's kind of mind-boggling to look at if you're not a numbers person, but if you wade through it, you can see what we have found to be important.

Take a look at it some time. And then think about what your priorities for this parish are. This is, after all, your church - our church - the Body of Christ in Hyde Park entrusted to our stewardship. Think about what we ought to be spending our precious resources on.

I know that when I do this, I come up with a list a mile long - far more ambitious than we could ever do in ten years, let alone one. I think up things that would cost more than the biggest churches could pay for or find volunteers for. But I do it anyway. Because it helps me remember that there is much to do in the world - it never ends.

Then I come back to reality. I try to figure out what is necessary, desirable and possible for us right here, right now.

So I say again, look around your church. What is the mission you want to fulfill? What is the work (liturgical, educational, outreach, spiritual) that you want to invest in? In other words, what are your priorities?

Nobody's promising that we can spend the money on anything you want. But if you haven't let me know where you think God is leading us, how can I or the Vestry know?

So drop me a line with your priorities. Even if it's not possible now, it might guide us in the future. Either way, the old saying of putting your money where your mouth is holds true. We put our money where our heart is. And it is your heart that this church wants to engage.
