"Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, `I am he!' and, `The time is near!' Do not go after them."

Brothers and Sisters:

The election has come and gone. For many - for half the nation in fact - it did not go as hoped. For others, it was what they hoped for. And for others still, they don't know what to make of it. None of us knows how it will all play out in the end, but for Christians, it's important to remember that this is not our end game. It is important to take part in the councils of the nation, of course. I consider it a sacred duty to vote, to contribute to the community.

At the same time, my research into the history of this nation especially for the Graveyard Tours, the Fireside Chats and other speaking engagements I've taken part in this year, have shown me one thing. We have never been a unified country. From our inception, we have been - to a greater or lesser degree - just on this side of total breakup. The Civil War was an extreme moment when it all boiled over, but the divisions have never gone away.

That means that, whether Donald Trump or Hillary Clinton had won, there would still be division. No one person has ever changed that. No one person has the power to destroy or build up, and we must not fool ourselves into thinking either. Jesus hints at this in this Sunday's gospel when he tells his followers, "Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, 'I am he!' and, 'The time is near!' Do not go after them."

In those days, there were many who claimed they would free Israel from Roman rule or knew the secret to divine knowledge or holiness. They were often charlatans. Others proclaimed doom, gloom and resignation. Either way, they distracted from what mattered.

And what mattered to Jesus? Same as always. Proclaiming the good news of God's love for all. Caring (and advocating) for the marginalized. Hospitality. Healing. This was what he called them to - despite persecution, fear, and temptations to chase after false messiahs.

Perhaps that's our challenge in these days following the election. Whether you cheered or wept, it's important to remember who our one true leader is: Jesus Christ. It's important for us to remember our one true mission: reconciliation of the world with God. We can't do that by putting our trust - or all our hopes - in any one person. In turmoil or calm, we know our mission: To worship God and to reach out to our neighbors in love. Yes, that means those who have different political views, but it especially means those who have no voice.

As an example of that, this past week there has been considerable controversy over Church World Services bringing Syrian refugees into Dutchess County (on a very small basis). Many oppose it because they are a different religion, different culture, potentially dangerous. This is truly a long-suffering, beaten down population. Our work is to care for them, our brothers and sisters in need.

So let us put our hope in Christ, not in any person. Let us follow Christ, not the world. Let us not fear, but speak and act with grace and wisdom which comes from the Holy Spirit.
